LIVING BEYOND MYSELF

"So Christ himself gave the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, the pastors and teachers, to equip his people for **works of service**, so that the body of Christ may be built up" – Ephesians 4:11-16

What would happen if our whole church would get involved in serving? What would happen if every follower of Jesus devoted their God-given talents and passions to accomplishing God's good work in the world? Think of the lives changed, the relationships created and the love of God shared in our church, our community and in the world. It would be an incredible experience if everyone here at

Peace discovered the joy of serving others in a new way.

This September we will begin a three-part sermon series called "Living Beyond Myself." It's based on a book called The Volunteer Revolution. The series imagery is of a ordinary pitcher of clean, clear, refreshing water being poured out. God's grace and love for us

is poured out into us through Jesus Christ. We are filled to overflowing so that we might be poured out into the lives of others. John's gospel records, "Whoever believes in me, as Scripture has said, 'rivers of living water will flow from within them'." Our living beyond ourselves is like living water flowing beyond us as we serve others in Christ.

The pouring pitcher takes on a slightly different meaning when it is combined with basin and towel. These are the symbols of Jesus washing the feet of the disciples and

telling us "Now that I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also should wash one another's feet. I have set you an example that you should do as I have done for you."


Jesus was our example for selfless serving. The pitcher, bowl and towel become our reminder of who we are and how we are to live as followers of Jesus.



After worship we will have the annual pie auction. While the pie auction is going on, the children will be "blessing the school bus" and kicking off the year with games.



Setting the Foundation for Family Values

I feel like I'm always in a bit of a tug-of-war with the world when it comes to teaching my kids Biblical values. There was time in our nation's history when we had a basic shared set of values, whether you were a Christian or not. That isn't true anymore. I have to worry, not only about what they are watching on TV and social media, but also what they are learning at school and hearing from friends.

I recently heard of the "law of first." Basically the "law of first" says whatever you hear about a particular subject first, sets the foundation for how you view that subject in the future. For example, if I tell my children that illegal drugs are harmful and they need to stay away from them but their friend has already told them how great drugs are, they will view what I say through the already-set foundation of what their friend told them

I learned this first hand. My family isn't too interested in sports. The kids are in a couple of sports in school but, beyond that, no one watches sports or attends games. If you ask us at any given time how a sports team is doing, we wouldn't have a clue. With that said, I have lived in Minnesota most of my life so I want our teams to do well. Recently two of my children declared themselves to be Packers fans. All my children were born and have lived in Minnesota their entire lives, so logically they should root for the home team. I told them this, but to no avail, their friends are Packers fans so they're Packers fans — no amount of cajoling will convince them otherwise.

This is a silly story but it reveals an important truth: every day, kids are setting the foundations of their values and beliefs. Some of the foundations are unimportant, like should I be a Vikings or Packers fan. Others are vitally important, like what we believe about our faith.

Of course, breaking up that incorrect foundation to lay a new, correct foundation is possible but, just like the foundation of a building, it is easier, and less painful, to do it correctly the first time.

The question is: in the middle of baths, story time, trips to school activities, etc., are you setting the foundation for the values you want your children to have or are they getting it from other places?

My kids can sniff out a lecture in a New York minute, so I am always on the hunt for fun ways to help solidify our family's values. Ways that won't have them daydreaming about video games until I'm done talking. Following are some ideas I've found:

Roleplay Kindness

Kids want to be heard. So at dinner, in the car, or anytime you have some extra time, ask questions — the more, the better. Mix in silly questions with real ones. Make it fun by using a fake microphone or speaking with an accent. Ask questions like:

- What would you do if you noticed a friend being bullied on the playground?
- Would you rather eat a rotten egg or burned brussels sprouts?
- What would you do if a friend kept talking about you behind your back?
- Would you rather wear your pants backward to school or wear no shoes to school?

Kids won't get it right every time, but it's encouraging when they do. Having these types of conversations may also open the door to other concerns that may be on their mind.

Create Moments for Generosity

It's not often kids are in a position to be generous with their time and money. However, kids tend to be generous; they just need opportunities to show it. Be on the lookout for any time your church or community offers a chance for families to serve together. Asking your kids if they have ideas on how to love and serve neighbors can create opportunities where they are most invested.

Practice Patience

Pull out your phone or a timer and have a family competition. Who can stay quiet the longest? Who can stand on one leg without moving the longest? Or when you go to a restaurant, offer the dessert choice to

the person who waits with the best attitude.

A child who waits well is headed toward becoming an adult who can wait on bigger things. Waiting for Mom to get off the phone or waiting their turn in a game seems small, but this will later translate into waiting for a job or a spouse or a house. Waiting is one of those skills that translates into trusting God well. Can they trust that God has their best interests in mind?

Share Stories of Faith

Reading the Bible and learning about all the characters from Moses to Ruth to Mary can create great opportunities for discussion. However, faith becomes very real and engaging when children hear about their own grandparents, aunts and uncles, not just following God, but wrestling with God.

You can make it fun by telling stories in a dramatic voice at bedtime. It also opens the door to questions and comments about their own faith journey.

Open Our Lives

Matthew 5:16 says, "Let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven."

Although this verse isn't a "value," it creates the ideal environment for values to thrive. When we open our hearts, homes and lives to others, God brings other, unexpected families into our lives. Through these encounters — from offering acts of kindness to strangers, to serving families or practicing authentic friendships with community groups from church — families can experience Jesus and learn that living out family values can indeed be fun.

There are lots of other ideas, too, so keep your ears open. If you find a good one, share them with other parents. Parenting is easier when we do it together.

August Bible Quiz Question—What does the Bible say we should guard above all else? *Proverbs 4:23 "Above all else, guard your heart, for everything you do flows from it."*

In the Old Testament the word "heart" is used more than 800 times. Of those 800 times, 200 deal specifically with the thought life, emotions - those things that motivate and mold us. So why did Solomon tell his son, "above all else, guard your heart; for everything you do flows from it?" Why is our thought life so important?

Jesus told the pharisees in Matthew 12:34 "You brood of vipers! How can you speak good things, when you are evil? For out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaks." (emphasis added). Simply put, what we think about comes out in our speech and actions - it becomes who we are. I'm not talking about the passing thought that comes and goes, like "what should we have for dinner." It's those thoughts that we dwell on that take up residence in our heart. We have to guard what goes into our heart.

Many people think they are not influenced by what they see or hear. The advertising industry would disagree. Statistics show that Americans are exposed to between 4,000 - 10,000 ads per day. That's per day, in case you missed it. They would not spend the money if it didn't work.

While we can't completely avoid all the negative things around us, we can choose what we allow into our hearts. How do we do this? Sometimes it is as simple as spending more time with God by reading the Bible and praying. We might need to make better choices about what we read or watch. Other times it isn't so easy. Maybe we need to choose different close friends who uplift and encourage. It's different for each person, so spend some time thinking about areas of your life that may need changing.

When thinking about how to handle difficult or negative people, remember that we are guarding our heart against those <u>things</u> that will have a negative influence in our hearts, not against people. Wounded and lost people are crying out for connection and love in this world, and it is our calling as the church of Christ to reach out to them, to love them, even if we don't like their attitude or actions. So don't avoid these people, rather work on finding the challenging balance between being "...in the world but not of the world."

One final thought, for those with children at home, we have to think about not only guarding our own hearts but also the hearts of our children. So be careful not only about what you allow them to watch but also what <u>you</u> watch, say, and do in front of them. They see more than we think, and they

will pick it up. My dad used to say to me all the time "do as I say, not as I do." I can tell you that I not only found this confusing and hypocritical, I also did what he did, not what he said. Children learn by example so think about the example you are setting.

Remember, God's grace is sufficient, so if there are things that need changing, just talk to Him about it.


